VOTERS TO CONSIDER SEWER LATERAL INCREASE

On Tues., April 2, 2013, Richmond Heights voters will be asked to decide whether the City may raise the annual maximum fee charged for the City's Sewer Lateral Replacement Program.

The fee now stands at \$28 per dwelling annually. If Proposition S is approved by a simple majority of voters, the fee could go up to a maximum of \$50 a year per dwelling unit. The increase would appear on property tax bills issued by the St. Louis County Assessor in December 2013.

In April 1999, Richmond Heights voters passed the ballot initiative authorizing the City to establish the Sewer Lateral Replacement Program. The fee col-

lected annually from residents is set aside in a special fund to cover the cost of repairs to damaged sewer lateral lines — specifically those that have come to the end of their useful service life.

Repairs and replacements up to \$7,000 are then free of charge to Richmond Heights residents. To see review the program's complete guidelines, please visit the City's website at <http://www.richmondheights.org/DocumentCenter/Home/View/4934>.

Now in its 13th year of operations, the Sewer Lateral Replacement program remains one of the City's most popular residential services.

fall of program revenues, completed repairs and projected requests for service, the City Council concluded that expenditures are outpacing revenues. Without an increase to the annual fee, the Sewer Lateral Re-

placement program will need to be significantly modified. Rather than asking homeowners to pay a portion of the cost for a sewer lateral replacement, the City Council decided to ask voters for

THERE'S STILL TIME TO APPLY FOR A RAINSCAPE REBATE

Landowners in Richmond Heights (and other participating municipalities) are eligible to take part in a RainScape Rebates program.

RainScape Rebates is a voluntary program that financially assists landowners in the Deer Creek Watershed who wish to landscape their yards to improve stormwater management. The overall goal is to improve water quality in Deer Creek and its tributaries by installing landscaping that will help capture rain where it falls instead of allowing the water to run off site.

Seventy-five percent of

the available funds will be reserved for residential landowners; the remaining 25 percent will be available for schools, churches, businesses, and parks. The maximum rebate per site is 75 percent of documented expenses up to \$2,000.

COUNCIL DISTRICT 3 VOTERS TO FILL A VACANT COUNCIL SEAT

Two residents are certified candidates on the April 2, 2013 Special Municipal Election ballot to fill the balance of an unexpired term representing the residents of Richmond Heights City Council District 3.

The candidates are Megan Moylan of Del Norte Avenue and Mark T. Cockson of West Park Avenue.

The successful candidate will represent the residents of District 3 alongside City Council Member Ed Notter, now in his second term.

The election of former City Council Member Gina Mitten to the Missouri House of Representatives last November left a vacancy of more than three years on the City Council. Thus the City Charter requires that a Special Election be held to fill that vacancy, which expires in April 2016.

To help voters become acquainted with the candidates, each one was asked to respond to four questions for publication in this edition of

RH Community Update. Their responses have been edited only for clarity or length.

MEGAN MOYLAN

Q. What personal information about yourself and your family would you like to share with voters in Richmond Heights?



A. My husband and I bought our first house in Richmond Heights in 2005. We loved that Richmond Heights offered us a close-knit community, a rapidly improving school district and easy access to a variety of educational and cultural opportunities. When our third child was born, we quickly realized that we needed a bigger house. We had a long list of wants for our new house, but (at the) top of the list was staying in Richmond Heights. We had become attached to the community, our neighbors and the overall richness of life in Richmond Heights (and) it was difficult for us to imagine leaving. We moved into our (present) house in District Three in November of 2011 and have been grateful ever since that we were able to stay.

Q. What information about your career or occupation would you like to share with voters?

A. I have past work experience in human resources, social services and teaching. While working in human resources at Bridge Information Systems and Reuters America, I recruited employees, provided benefits support, and planned events. Prior to this, I worked for the State of Missouri where I helped elderly and disabled people with benefits. I plan to return to teaching in the near future. My experiences have exposed me to many people and issues. I am very adept at helping people resolve issues under a variety of circumstances. I know these skills will serve my constituents well on the City Council. While home with my children, I have looked for opportunities to get involved in my community including volunteering for HopeBUILD, Joe's Place, the M-RH School District and others.

Q. What information about your political experience would you like to share with voters?

A. This will be the first time I have held political office and I look forward to representing my neighbors on the City Council.

Q. In your opinion, what are the three

most important issues before the City of Richmond Heights?

A. The most important issues facing Richmond Heights residents are completing the Hadley Township redevelopment, maintaining services and supporting public safety. Currently, Hadley Township has many vacant properties and is experiencing blight. I believe we need to find a redevelopment plan that works for all residents. My second priority is to keep a high level of service to our residents while being fiscally responsible. We need to provide services that attract and retain young families and enable aging residents to live independently in their homes. Lastly, we need to support public safety. My neighbors and I have had experiences with prisoners escaping from the jail during transport. Although the police have responded promptly and professionally, we need to prevent this from happening. We need to build a secure area (sally port) attached to the jail so that prisoners can be transported safely. If elected, I will make finding the funds to build this area a priority.

MARK COCKSON

Q. What personal information about yourself and your family would you like to share with voters in Richmond Heights?



A. I am the retired father of three grown children. My two eldest are professionals in the health care and hospitality fields, respectively. My youngest attends community college. All three children attended Clayton Schools during the 26 years I have lived in Richmond Heights.

Q. What information about your career or occupation would you like to share with voters?

A. For 40+ years I worked in the fields of education (teacher, seventh through 12th grades; Parents -As-Teacher educator for 3- to 5-year-olds); social service (ending as foster parent and adoption trainer); non-profit management (City Museum and Hostelling International-Gateway Council). My organizational and customer service skills make me ideally suited for politics. My experience with strategic planning, fund accounting, and personnel issues mesh well with serving on the Richmond Heights City Council.

Q. What information about your political experience would you like to share with voters?

A. Parent Teacher Organization representative for Ralph M. Captain Elementary School (one year); Richmond Heights Beautification Commission (three years), and Friends of the City of Richmond Heights Board of Directors member and treasurer (two years).

Q. In your opinion, what are the three most important issues before the City of Richmond Heights?

A. Richmond Heights is the crossroads of St. Louis County. The far-reaching vision of prior administrations set up the revitalization of Saint Louis Galleria and the building of THE HEIGHTS: Richmond Heights Community Center and Memorial Library. The issues for our future are:

- (a) renewing our infrastructure, especially streets, lighting and signage;
- (b) safeguarding our current sources of revenue while exploring new sources;
- (c) providing services for our residents, e.g., utility tax "breaks" for seniors and augmenting police protection by adding a social worker for the frequent "non-emergency" call that they get.

permission to raise the allowable maximum fee collected so as to continue providing the service at no cost to property owners up to \$7,000.

The City's Sewer Lateral Technician averaged 94 video requests per year since 2005. The cost for this service by private plumbing contractors can be \$200 and up.

The City performed 254 repairs from 2005 through 2011 at a total cost of \$749,958 — an average of \$2,953 per repair.

Since 2001, the City's Sewer Lateral technician has been using a video camera investigation procedure to provide residents with faster diagnostic results. The City can give residents next-day diagnostic results while helping the City keep costs down as much as possible by eliminating unnecessary repairs.

Less than a year after being elected to a third term on the Richmond Heights City Council, Gina Mitten bid the City Council farewell as she headed off to represent District 83 in the Missouri House of Representatives. She was sworn into office in Jefferson City in January 2013.

Mitten performed her last official duties as a member of the Richmond Heights City Council in December 2012 where Mayor James Beck read a proclamation thanking her for more than eight years of dedicated service to the City and its residents.

The Mayor expressed every confidence that Mitten would serve the 83rd District's constituents well.

Mitten is an attorney with the St. Louis Lawyers Group. She was first elected to the Richmond Heights City Council in 2004. She was elected to a second term in 2008 and a third in 2012.

A special election will be held in April to fill her seat on the City Council. (See

related story beginning on Page 1.)

While serving on the City Council, the City dealt with many issues -- the redesign of Interstate 64, construction of the MetroLink Cross County Extension, completion of The Boulevard-Saint Louis development, the opening of Nordstrom at Saint Louis Galleria, and many other projects.

She also worked as a voting member of the Clayton-Richmond Heights Joint Study Committee and served on three of its subcommittees. Mitten was active with the St. Louis County Municipal League's legislative affairs committee, and was a delegate for the Third Congressional District in 2008.

A native of University City, Ms. Mitten and her husband Nelson have two children. The family has lived in Richmond Heights for about 20 years. Their children attended M-RH Schools.
